Recognition

Each November Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) recognizes its large volunteer force at the Elly Doyle Park Service Award ceremony. The summer of 2015 was a very happy summer for me – I was invited to join the crew at Huntley Meadows! Lucky me! I am **Jennifer (Jen) Crawford**, a new Natural History Interpreter and Programmer. I started working HMP camps this summer and now teach Nature for Tiny Tots, Nature Detectives, and Science for Home Schoolers. You also might see me leading a birthday party, a school group, or scouts.

It all started in my youth when I used to come home late for dinner...after a day catching tadpoles, frogs, and salamanders in the pond with my best friend. No matter the consequences, I was back the next day! My friend and I studied our catches – their colors, behaviors and changes – and raised a few tadpoles into frogs. After that, I looked for as many experiences as possible to learn more about animals in nature. Behind me now are many biology classes, lots of field trips, and loads of time outdoors from high school through college and into my adult life.

When I retired from my first paying profession, I decided to purposefully increase my involvement with nature. While living in Naples, Florida I discovered the Florida Master Naturalist program. I immediately took all three habitat courses - coastal, wetlands, and uplands. With my new qualifications, I volunteered to lead children's programs at the Audubon jewel, Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary, and at the Nature Conservancy of Southwest Florida. I was a guide for an eco-tour company called Orchids and Egrets that treated executives to the

ultimate conference break – a walk in the wetlands, the woods, or on the beach. To my naturalist credentials I added a Masters' in Education and then moved north.

While teaching elementary school in Fairfax County, I found the Virginia Master Naturalist Program and following my natural instincts, got involved with volunteering. I balanced teaching and volunteering for the next five years. Most significant was the opportunity to serve on the Fairfax Master Naturalist Training Committee improving the Basic Training Course by summarizing speaker presentations into one-page fact sheets for quick reference, increasing educational practices, and piloting nature-based sites for training.

Realizing how much fun the nature experiences provided me, I took a risk and left the teaching profession on sabbatical. That's when I discovered "roving" for Fairfax County Parks where I taught science to school groups outdoors. My teaching and nature interests fused. I saw the opportunity to do this as an employee and jumped! Full circle: I'm so glad I landed at Huntley! I look forward to giving my best to the Park's nature programs.

I want to thank everyone at Huntley Meadows Park for giving me such a warm welcome. My name is **Cheryl Repetti**, and I am the new Historical Interpreter and Site Coordinator for Historic Huntley. I have taken a somewhat unusual path to reach this position, but I think my experience suits it well.

When I was seven years old, my mother convinced my father to take us camping. Every vacation since involved a tent. For me, one of the highlights of each trip was attending the ranger interpretative programs.

But it wasn't really a career I seriously considered (far too much fun to be a real job) when I was younger, and my education reflects that. I have a Bachelor of Fine Arts in studio arts from The Cooper Union and a Doctorate in sociology from George Washington University. I have found that my interest and training in art and sociology have served me well in working as an interpreter for the Park Authority. Art, like programming, is a creative endeavor, plus there are all those crafts! Sociology uses scientific methodology to understand how social systems function, but to do so also involves taking a historical approach. So moving back and forth between natural science and history isn't unfamiliar territory for me.

I also have a fondness for old buildings, a result of having a father who works as an architect and of growing up in a 1904 Victorian house in New York City. When my kids were four years old I enrolled them in a cooperative preschool that was located in a historic building in Centreville, VA. Curiosity about the history of the preschool house led to my becoming involved in the Historic Centreville Society and the Friends of Historic Centreville. My children also led me to Ellanor C. Lawrence Park (ECLP), where we enjoyed Kids Korner with Miss Karen and Miss Jamie. I volunteered there and was subsequently hired in 2009 to lead school field trips. Like Huntley Meadows Park, ECLP has both natural and cultural resources that Park staff interpret. I found that I really enjoyed digging for worms with second graders one day and dressing in a hoop skirt to churn butter the next, so much so that I spent the last six years doing just that.

Now I am excited to have some new challenges at the Historic Huntley house in addition to continuing to enjoy both natural and historical interpretation at Huntley Meadows Park.


Monday Morning Bird Walk

When we consider birds in winter, we are often only discussing those species that spend their winters in our region. But to fully understand the wintering of most birds, we must look at the full range of wintering habitat in both North and South America. Some argue that the greatest threat to many North American birds occurs south of the United States/Mexican border. At current growth rates, the population in tropical America will double during this century, meaning that the remaining areas of undisturbed natural environment will be greatly reduced. Especially harmful to North American songbirds will be the continuing destruction of the tropical rain forest. Many rain forests are being cleared for grazing land to raise cattle to provide cheap meat for the fast food diet of North America.

Additionally, the estuarine and wetland habitats needed by migrating species are lost as populations grow. Finally, those pesticides most dangerous to birds that are controlled in the United States are not regulated as well in the tropical countries of South and Central America.

In short, much of needed winter territory for western hemisphere birds is going fast. The preservation of many of the bird species we like to call 'ours' rests on our ability to help the people of Latin America to save their habitats. Of course, the same can be said of the people of the United States.

Historic Huntley News

25th Anniversary of Friends of Historic Huntley (FOHH) Ushers in Expanded Mission: Preserving Historic Huntley and Related Cultural Resources through Advocacy and Education


For the Huntley community, this has certainly been a banner year of celebration, marking the 40th, 30th, and 25th anniversaries of Huntley Meadows Park (HMP), the Friends of Huntley Meadows Park (FOHMP), and the FOHH, respectively. In quieter moments, these milestones have also been a cause for reflection about the course traveled in years past and about the course to be charted into the future. To formally harness such reflections, an ad hoc FOHH committee convened a special August meeting in the Watson Reading Room of Old Town's Alexandria Black History Museum (which, by the way, has an associated non-adjointing wetlands property). There, within the city previously governed by Huntley's T. F. Mason as mayor of Alexandria, committee members deliberated over the mission statement guiding FOHH activities.

That mission statement focused primarily on the preservation of Historic Huntley. Consistent with this statement, the efforts of FOHH for most of its 25-year history were directed towards obtaining County restoration of the Huntley villa and opening it to the public. That happy event finally occurred in May 2012. The question before the ad hoc committee was how FOHH should continue to direct its energies in support of Historic Huntley. The committee recognized that Huntley's story encompasses not just the structures at 6918 Harrison Lane, but additional artifacts and properties. For example, the southern boundaries of T.F. Mason's original landholdings are demarcated by double-ditch fencing put in place by President George Washington. In addition, T.F. Mason's brother, Richard Chichester, built a neighboring home ("Oakley") on property adjacent to that of T.F.

Both the double-ditch fencing and the remains of Oakley are encompassed within the boundaries of Huntley Meadows Park. Located on an island of greenspace amidst an urban sea of increasing population pressures, these cultural resources face the same development threats that all resources located on undeveloped property face today. To ensure that these and other tangible aspects of Huntley's story are not lost for lack of vigilance, the committee crafted the following statement as the proposed FOHH mission: "To preserve Historic Huntley *and related cultural resources* through advocacy and education."

Just three days after the full Board of FOHH adopted this mission statement verbatim, it was put into action. FOHH and FOHMP sent a joint Friends letter to Mr. Kirk Kincannon, Fairfax County Park Authority Director, seeking proper identification, accounting, and preservation of the double-ditch fencing. The County initiated an archaeological study within a week of the letter's receipt. So begins the march down the road to future anniversaries of HMP, FOHMP, and FOHH. It promises to be a journey of challenges, accomplishments, and camaraderie as we all draw together to protect not only HMP's natural resources, but also Historic Huntley's related cultural resources within HMP.

Dominion Virginia Power (Dominion) is planning to replace an aging 230 Kilovolt (kv) transmission line along a 2.6 mile stretch between its Belvoir and Gum Springs Substations in Fairfax County. This project is located directly on Huntley Meadows Park (HMP) Property along the southern boundary within an already established Dominion easement.

As you might imagine, Friends of Huntley Meadows Park (FOHMP) and Friends of Historic Huntley (FOHH) are monitoring this project very closely. We are committed to ensuring there are no adverse impacts to the sensitive natural, cultural, and historic resources in HMP, especially in and adjacent to the project area.

A Remembrance

It is with fond memories and all due respect that we note the recent passing of our classroom Eastern Kingsnake. These snakes are large (36-72"), shiny-black, smooth-scaled, and with distinctive white chain-link bands that vary in width in different geographic populations. Females can lay up to several dozen eggs in mid summer with the young hatching in late summer.

The Huntley Meadows Kingsnake was confirmed to be a female having laid ~15 eggs in April of 2015. As she was a captive snake and lived all year in a relatively stable climate, it is not surprising that she produced eggs out of sync with the natural world. The eggs were unviable as they did not have a chance to become fertilized.

Eastern Kingsnakes have one of the largest geographic ranges of any North American snake species, are nonvenomous constrictors, thrive in many terrestrial habitats as well as in areas close to water. They eat a variety of prey, including lizards, rodents, birds, turtle eggs, and even other snakes. Eastern Kingsnakes are immune to the venom of other snakes in their range.

The Huntley Meadows resident Kingsnake was an important part of instruction in various classes at the Park for over 15 years, giving visitors of all ages a rare close up view of wildlife. This particular Kingsnake was placed in a living location within the classroom that allowed for it to be seen from the Norma Hoffman Visitor Center vestibule. She was a popular member of the Park's limited number of live wildlife representatives, and an exciting greeter for all visitors. She will be missed by many.

Note: Park Staff is in the process of procuring another Eastern Kingsnake from a reputable source.
