

Make a Difference in Your Favorite Park...

- ◆ Remove the dirt and mud from your shoes before visiting the Park. Seeds travel easily in dirt and mud. With invasive plants ranking as a top issue facing parks, this simple act makes a huge difference.
- ◆ Go one step further and help prevent pathogens, like ranavirus, from spreading. Before and after each Park visit remove the dirt and mud from your shoes and then wash your soles in a 3% bleach solution and let fully dry before your next Park visit. Ranavirus has caused massive amphibian die-offs and can also affect reptiles and fish.
- ◆ Staying on official trails is an awesome way to help preserve the Park's resources, but if you must go off trail, feel good about your actions by performing the above protocols. All Park staff and volunteers should follow this protocol too.

Huntley Welcomes Spring with Huntley Farm Day

At Historic Huntley: Saturday, April 16, 1-4 p.m.

Huntley will host a special event celebrating its Harrison era. During this time (1868-1946), Huntley became a dairy farm and home to the Harrison family headed by Albert W. Harrison. The Harrisons significantly modified the Huntley villa to accommodate living there year-round. House tours during Huntley Farm Day will emphasize these changes (which had to be undone to reveal Huntley's current, earlier Mason era appearance). You will come to see Huntley in a whole new way! Farm Day will be a family friendly event with storytelling and baby animals from Frying Pan Park. Representing the fact that most of Fairfax County was once farmland, staff from nearby Green Spring Gardens will be on hand with information about their historic house and farming history. Displays on the Woodlawn Agricultural Society (to which the Harrisons were members) will show that maintaining close connections with the neighbors was important for farmers.

So, neighbor, don't be shy - come on over on April 16th and help us celebrate Huntley Farm Day!

President's Message

Protecting the natural, historical and cultural resources on Huntley Meadows Park (HMP) property is a high priority for the Board of Directors of Friends of Huntley Meadows Park (FOHMP). The Board is working hard to stay on top of activities that could impact the Park. These activities are not just on the Park's property; we also monitor and engage with our neighbors to make sure that project impacts outside of or adjacent to our property do not adversely impact HMP's ecosystem. This month we share with you below details of two large scale projects that could have such an impact. We are working very hard with local elected officials, Fairfax County staff, technical advisors, and project proponents to avoid adverse impacts. These projects are still going through various County, State and Federal reviews that will include public hearings or a public comment period. We intend to continue to advocate strongly and to insert ourselves into the process wherever possible to protect HMP so that it remains intact and protected for us and future generations to enjoy.

Dominion Virginia Power (Dominion) Project:

Dominion is planning to "replace an aging 230 kilovolt transmission line along a 2.6 mile stretch of existing right of way between its Belvoir and Gum Springs Substations in Fairfax". This project will occur along the southern boundary of the Park on HMP Property within an already established easement area. The project work will impact not only HMP property but also the neighborhoods directly to the south of the easement.

FOHMP is actively engaged in reviewing this project for impacts on all aspects of the environment (natural, historical, and cultural resources). We are also working closely with Friends of Historic Huntley regarding impacts on the viewshed and other historical and cultural resources on HMP property. This includes consulting with 3rd party technical experts with relevant backgrounds that inform our review and recommendations. We expect, at the least, to provide both written input and public testimony to influence the project's implementation so that it (1) avoids; (2) minimizes, and (3) proposes compensatory measures for any impacts identified that could not be adequately mitigated through project re-design. This process is challenging, and I invite those with technical expertise who could provide input for us to consider to email me at president.fohmp@gmail.com. A March 23, 2016 local public hearing is scheduled at 4:30PM and 7:00PM at Mount Vernon High School, 8515 Old Mt. Vernon Road, Alexandria, VA 22309. **Those wishing to testify** should arrive 15 minutes early to register. Fort Belvoir Residential Communities Initiative Project:

On contiguous Fort Belvoir Property in the southeastern region of HMP, the Fort Belvoir Residential Communities Initiative (RCI) is proposing a housing development on a currently wooded 51 acre tract of undeveloped land. This project also has potential adverse environmental impacts that have been identified. FOHMP has provided specific written comments informing the RCI team of these adverse impacts for HMP via the public comment period which ended on December 14, 2015. Since this is a federal property, we have engaged with and provided our input to our elected officials including Congressmen Beyer's and Connolly's offices, Supervisors Dan Storck (Mt. Vernon District) and Jeff McKay (Lee District), and others. Our goal is to protect the natural, historical, and cultural resources on HMP property from activities on neighboring property that may have potential adverse impacts. A DRAFT Supplemental Environmental Assessment has been completed and this included a DRAFT Finding of No Adverse Environmental Impact. We do not agree with this finding and have expressed this in our written comments and shared this opinion with our elected officials. We feel there are key components missing from the Supplemental Environmental Assessment based on our extensive knowledge of the Park, its water hydrology, vegetation, and wildlife. We recommended that a Full Environmental Impact Statement is needed before this project proceeds.

We welcome active engagement with these projects from you, our Friends, and hope to see you on the trails this spring!

Best Times to Visit Huntley Meadows in the Spring

The Park is open dawn to dark, and with 12+ hours of daylight there's lots of time to enjoy the HMP.

Early mornings

Great birding, great light for photography, peaceful walks, energizing jogs on the stone dust trails.

Mid-morning

School groups visit to enrich their required learning standards. Many thanks go to the Friends of Huntley Meadows Park for providing scholarships for schools in financial need. This strongly supports Huntley's mission of environmental education. Most school groups depart around noon.

Afternoon

Some wildflowers, like spring beauties, open their petals with the sun and close them at other times to protect their pollen. Sunny afternoons offer a great chance to see wildflowers at their most radiant. This is a peak time for butterflies and pollinating insects. Sunny days are great for turtles to bask on logs.

Late afternoon to dusk

Late afternoon provides great lighting for photographers. Cooler temperatures are a great time for a family walk. Wildlife is more active during this time of day, so keep an eye out for deer, beaver, and muskrat. You may also be serenaded by frogs or toads. Or enjoy a relaxing cool evening jog on the stone dust trails.

Monday Morning Bird Walk

In a journal entry in February of 1854, Henry David Thoreau wrote, "Is not January alone pure winter? December belongs to the fall - a wintery November - February to the spring - it is a snowy March." This description seems mostly true of the winter of 2015/16. Our January was pure winter indeed. Winter is usually a good season for birding. Many migrants settle in our area for the winter; leafless trees make spotting birds easier; there are no biting insects to contend with; and the heat and humidity are not factors. Sometimes, however, we might get too much of a good thing. Portions of this winter have thwarted the Monday Morning birders. The giant storm of January 22/23 forced us to cancel the Monday Morning walk because of icy trail conditions and a closed parking lot. Then again on February 15 we were forced to cancel because of weather. But, as I write this in late February, there is the annual hope of spring. Early spring flowers such as (*Galanthus nivalis*), are blooming as well as Winter Aconite (genus *Eranthum*). Neither of these is native to our area, but they offer a cheery presence to what otherwise is often a dreary background. Bird behavior shows signs of spring as well. We noticed Brown Creepers recently gathering in small groups as they prepare for the journey to northern nesting grounds. Wood Ducks and Hooded Mergansers have been pairing up and searching for nest sites. Our growing population of Red-headed Woodpeckers are exploring nesting holes as well. So, take a walk at Huntley and observe. Watch for these little signs in your wanderings at the Park. Again from a Thoreau Journal entry, "The question is not what you look at but how you look and whether you see."

The Monday Morning Bird Walk has been a weekly event at Huntley Meadows Park since 1985. It takes place every week, rain or shine (except during electrical storms, strong winds, or icy trails), at 7AM (8AM from November through March), is free of charge, requires no reservation, and is open to all. Support the Huntley Meadows Park 20th Annual Bird-a-thon 2016-Tuesday, May 3rd

Every year on a springtime Tuesday morning, Park staff and volunteers spread out across Huntley Meadows Park (HMP) to count birds. In 1997, an annual survey evolved into an event to remember and honor two exceptional men: Ken Howard and Ed Weigel. Both were volunteers who inspired a love of nature within the Park visitors they met. Their work continues to this day through the Park's Resource Management Internship funded by the HMP Bird-a-thon. This internship provides a young person with the opportunity to begin a career in conservation and to get hands-on experience in this wonderful Park. Over the years, I've had the privilege of interacting with the interns and believe this opportunity has a positive impact on their future endeavors and as stewards of our parks and green spaces.

Here is what some of the past years' interns have said about their experiences:

"I wanted to learn more about birds and reptiles, but I never expected to learn as much as I have."

"I have learned countless forest, meadow and wetland plant species, and I've learned about invasive plant management and herbicides."

"One of the main objectives of the internship is to assess the water quality of the wetland by taking the macro-invertebrate samples and identifying them...The diversity and amount of organisms I've gathered have really surprised me. Seeing the dedication of Huntley's staff and volunteers continues to inspire me to work harder."

It's hard to believe 2016 marks the 20th year of Bird-a-thon and 20 years for the Resource Management Internship. As a former staff person and now volunteer, I thoroughly enjoy my involvement with this fundraiser. We have experienced all types of birding conditions from cold and rainy to downright hot; some exceptional birding mornings, like sighting our all-time high of 109 species to having to search for one house sparrow to boost our numbers to 90 species; but no matter the day, it's always such a treat to be in the Park. I always complain about having to get up way too early, but I'm always rewarded with a memorable morning of wildlife watching and comradery with my fellow birders. **So, let's make our 20th Bird-a-thon event the best fundraising effort ever!!! -- Annie Stat**
