President's Message

I had the pleasure of traveling to Southeast China this past January. My husband and I traveled to this region to see birds and were lucky to see many, including the elegant Red-crowned Crane, my favorite bird of the trip. We also saw many other beautiful and very special birds, including globally threatened wetland species such as the Swan Goose, Baer's Pochard, Scaly-sided Merganser, Black-faced Spoonbill, and Oriental Stork. Sadly, we missed seeing the Spoon-billed Sandpiper and Relict Gull, two highly endangered species that rely upon China's rapidly disappearing coastal mudflats.

When traveling in other parts of the US as well as abroad, I find myself observing how environmental issues are taken into consideration with development projects. It is important to not re-invent the wheel, so we should learn from the helpful experiences of others. I am especially keen to note those practices that may be transferrable to Huntley Meadows Park (HMP), Fairfax County Park Authority, and Fairfax County overall.

While in China, I was pleased to observe very significant tree planting efforts along most urban streets and major roadways, including all of the road rights-of-way and medians. These new trees are certainly helping to improve air quality (an enormous challenge in China), provide needed shade (thereby reducing the urban heat island effect), beautify the urban streetscape, absorb storm water, control erosion, and reduce roadside noise. China has also made impressive progress in recent decades with reforesting its previously denuded hillsides; it was encouraging to see numerous hillsides that had been re-planted with a variety of presumably native species. On the other hand, I was very disappointed to observe the rapid loss of wetlands to expanding urban development; this included the reclamation of coastal mudflats, filling in and degradation of freshwater wetlands, and extensive new building construction within major floodplains.

The different examples of good and bad development practices in China and worldwide often provide useful insights to the development challenges faced here in Fairfax County. For example, with the EMBARK Richmond Highway planning effort underway, we need to ensure that maintaining and even expanding tree cover is an integral component of the plans for our neighborhoods along this corridor (a direct neighbor of HMP). We also need to prevent the further loss of wetlands, degradation of waterways, and construction within designated floodplains and Resource Protection Areas, as is being proposed in the vicinity of Dogue Creek, an important waterway that connects HMP with other aquatic ecosystems and is also an important wildlife corridor. We, and I refer to not just me and those of us actively attending the EMBARK meetings but all of us, must tell the EMBARK Advisory Group that we want balanced growth that includes ensuring that environment is included in the higher density planning.

My trip to China reinforced for me the importance of HMP as a well-protected wetland ecosystem that nonetheless faces significant pressures from planned developments outside of its borders--including but not limited to the EMBARK Richmond Highway planning effort. We are very fortunate indeed that FOHMP exists to advocate for the Park and reduce the outside pressures that would threaten the integrity of the Park and its ecosystems and wildlife. I am proud and honored to work with the dedicated and passionate Board and members that make up FOHMP.

I hope to see you outside on the trails!

Every year on an early morning in the beginning of May, Park staff and volunteers spread out across Huntley Meadows Park (HMP) to count birds. In 1997, an annual survey evolved into an event to remember and honor two exceptional men: Ken Howard and Ed Weigel. Both were volunteers who shared their love of nature with any Park visitor lucky enough to chat with them, inspiring visitors, volunteers and staff. Their work continues to this day through the Park's Resource Management Internship funded by the HMP Bird-a-thon. This internship provides a young person with the opportunity to begin a career in conservation and to get handson experience in this wonderful Park. Over the years, many on the Board of Friends of Huntley Meadows Park (FOHMP) have had the privilege of interacting with the interns, and we all believe this opportunity has a positive impact on their future endeavors as the next generation of stewards of our parks and green spaces.

Here is what some of the past years' interns have said about their experiences:

"I wanted to learn more about birds and reptiles, but I never expected to learn as much as I have."

"I have learned [to identify] countless forest, meadow and wetland plant species, and I've learned about invasive plant management and herbicides."

About performing water samples and collecting and identifying macroinvertebrates, "The diversity and amount of organisms I've gathered have really surprised me. Seeing the dedication of Huntley's staff and volunteers continues to inspire me to work harder."

For more than 20 years the FOHMP Board has sponsored the Bird-a-thon - that's more than 20 Resource Management Interns! All who participate in the count thoroughly enjoy their involvement with this fundraiser. Many are repeat volunteers for the event, and some have participated every year! They have counted birds in all kinds of conditions, from cold and rainy, to downright hot. Each year brings a new experience and new numbers, like sighting the all-time high of 108 species in 2004 or searching for one house sparrow to boost our numbers to 90 species. But no matter what happens, the feeling is that it's always such a treat to be in the Park.
